




Some hair-raising moments were had...

The Way of the Sail:

Sailing is a sport that one can easily interchange with the art of living. In the water, or on land, sometimes you cruise sometimes you race, but in either case the skills required are the same: attention to detail, flexibility of movement, determination to reach the goal, and concentration at each step of the way. The reward for the high expectation is pure Satisfaction! The steady balance of the keel... the windblown pull of the sails... the full bounce of the wave... the perfect timing at the mark; it is felt in the hand at wheel, in the rope pulling tight, in the shifting feet on the moving deck, but most of all, it is felt in the heart...

Sailing is the thrill of Life! And just as in life, you win some and lose some! Grand Cru won the first race, but getting out position, lost the second; low wind marked the third race on the second leg. Nevertheless, a day on Gulf waters with the wind in your hair is always a win!

The Way of the Race:

No Race Committee required for these Corinthian Race Events. All sailors are on the honor system to self-police and abide by the racing rules of sailing.

Shelly Russo & Jeff Gage placed the marks defining the race course with:

- One mark at 1,000' West of the Naples Pier,
- One mark located 1 mile, + 1,000 feet West of the Naples Pier.

Jennifer and Dennis Auray placed two additional marks:

- 1 mile Southwest of the pier
- 1 mile Southwest of the western most point of the triangle.

A triangle formed by the Start/Finish Line to the Naples Pier, to 1 mile west of the Naples Pier and back to the Start/Finish Line made for a 3 mile race course. Race #1... was a 2 mile course; shorter race from the start/finish to the pier and back. This race was won hands down with a lead exceeding 4 minutes over the next

closest by "Grand Cru", skippered by Susan Watkins from Naples.

Race #2... was a 3 mile course won by "Dragon Fly" skippered by Liza Brown from Marco Island.

Race #3... was won by "Windy City", skippered by Diane Fowler from Cape Coral.
